You're not alone: New data prompts call for action

Prostate cancer has overtaken breast cancer as Australia's leading cause of cancer, with a 34% jump in the estimated number of men diagnosed. The move is a call to action for policy makers and practitioners to support our review of the Clinical Guidelines for PSA Testing. New guidelines are needed to reduce late diagnoses and improve survival outcomes for Australian men.

TheraP clinical trial: 3 year follow up proves positive

The three-year follow-up results from the TheraP clinical trial for men with metastatic prostate cancer has found sustained benefits of LuPSMA treatment. The results found 66% of patients had a reduction of PSA by 50% or more, whereas only 37% of patients given cabazitaxel chemotherapy saw an equivalent reduction. The trial also found the side effects of LuPSMA were less severe.

Healthy lifestyle cuts prostate cancer mortality among high-risk men

Adherence to a healthy lifestyle is associated with close to a 50 per cent lower risk for developing lethal prostate cancer among men at high risk for the disease, according to a study recently published in *European Urology* (27 May 2022).

Anna Plym, Ph.D., from Brigham and Women's Hospital in Boston, and colleagues examined whether men at an increased genetic risk for prostate cancer can offset their risk for disease or disease progression by adhering to a healthy lifestyle. The analysis included 12,411 genotyped men participating in the Health Professionals Follow-up Study (1993 to 2019) and the Physicians' Health Study (1983 to 2010).

The researchers found that the polygenic risk score (PRS) enabled risk stratification not only for overall prostate cancer but also for lethal disease, with a fourfold difference between men in the highest and lowest quartiles.

Assessment and Mitigation of Cardiovascular Risk in Patients With Prostate Cancer Receiving ADT

An article in the *International Journal of Clinical Practice* (17 May 2022) reports on a comprehensive review on the impact of androgen deprivation therapy (ADT) on cardiovascular disease (CVD). It provides insights regarding the management of patients with advanced prostate cancer by highlighting the benefits and risks related to the use of gonadotropin-releasing hormone (GnRH) antagonists compared with that of luteinizing hormone-releasing hormone (LHRH) agonists.

The abstract for the article reads:

CVD is a common comorbidity in patients with prostate cancer. In this review, we summarise the published literature on the association of cardiovascular risk with androgen deprivation therapy (ADT) treatment and explore the potential differences between the gonadotropin-releasing hormone (GnRH) agonists and antagonists and the molecular mechanisms that may be involved. We also provide a practical outlook on the identification of underlying CV risk and explore the different stratification tools available. Results.

While not definitive, the current evidence suggests that GnRH antagonists may be associated with lower rates of certain CV events vs agonists, particularly in patients with pre-existing CVD. Risk reduction strategies such as lifestyle advice, consideration of ADT modality, and co-medications may help to reduce CV risk factors and improve outcomes in prostate cancer patients receiving ADT.

Conclusions. Given all the data that is currently available, identification of baseline CV risk factors may be key to risk mitigation in patients with prostate cancer receiving ADT.

Use of Hydrogel Spacers Prior to Radiation Therapy for Prostate Cancer

Insertion of a hydrogel spacer is a low-morbidity surgical intervention that may reduce rectal toxicity after radiation therapy in patients with prostate cancer. The insertion technique is relatively simple and is typically performed under general anaesthetic.

In a review of the use of hydrogel spacers prior to radiation therapy for prostate cancer published in *BJU International* (10 June 2022), the authors outline the

published data regarding the impact of hydrogel spacers on rectal separation, rectal radiation dosimetry, and rectal toxicities. The authors discuss the types of hydrogel spacers used, practicalities of inserting hydrogel spacers, and complications associated with hydrogel spacer insertion.

The study concludes that hydrogel spacers provide a low-morbidity method to potential

reduce rectal toxicity after radiation therapy in men with prostate cancer. Data outlining sexual function and oncological outcomes are limited to date. Future studies, currently being conducted, may provide further clarification of the role of hydrogel spacers in prostate cancer management.
